Story of the Year

A question we are often asked is, "How difficult is it to train a raptor to sit on a glove in front of an audience?" While there are many factors involved—and certainly hundreds of hours spent with these birds—one key trait is a bird's disposition, or its inherent temperament. This brings me to the story of how we came upon TRC's star avian ambassador, Gus the Golden Eagle.

Twenty years ago this summer, Gus fledged from a nest in central Wyoming and, days later, was found on the ground, unable to fly. His right wing was clearly injured. A landowner had alerted a local warden, who called me for help. At that time, Teton Raptor Center was based out of our home here in Jackson, Wyoming, so I drove out with high hopes of helping him recover and return to the wild. Little did I know that the long bones in his wing were permanently deformed—either from an accidental injury as a nestling or a congenital condition.

When I first met Gus, he was inside a large dog kennel. Our goal was to transfer him to another of my own kennels—not an easy task with a young Golden Eagle. My colleague first tried using a large net,

but Gus would have nothing of it. I carried an assortment of heavy leather falconry gloves, and with my hands and arms protected, I carefully opened the kennel door and offered him a stable "perch" on my glove. To my surprise, Gus stepped on gently—without clamping down—and allowed me to lift him into the new kennel. He stood quietly for a minute, curious rather than alarmed.

Disposition mattered. Over the next several years, Gus lived in our yard and his own enclosure. He calmly stepped onto my glove countless times. Over twenty years, tens of thousands of people have met Gus, learning about Golden Eagles at arm's length. Trainers have shared quiet, unforgettable moments with him, watching his signature run-and-hop gait up and down the hallway of the Roost.

Gus—a unique, gentle, 6.5-pound Wyoming native—has never flown a day of his life, nor taken the life of any prey. Yet he has taken our hearts by teaching us patience, connection, and awe. I don't believe I trained Gus as much as he trained all of us—to pause, look into his eyes, and glimpse the wonder of a truly wild place.


And so, Gus teaches us still—twenty years on—that wonder lives in the meeting of eyes, in the quiet before a moment of connection, and in the courage to step gently into another being's world. His story is an invitation to all of us: to pause, to notice, and to carry the gift of awe wherever we go. That is the heart of the WOW we seek to share.

FINANCE: Teton Raptor Center's fiscal year is from June 1st through May 31st and the statistics reported in this publication focus on FY24-25, June 1, 2024 - May 31, 2025. In FY24-25, TRC generated \$2,401,267 in revenue, (includes \$185,500 in restricted funds to support TRC's capital improvements). Total operational expenses were \$2,386,591 (includes non-cash depreciation expense of \$328,179). 
Income By Source OPERATING REVENUE

Launching Careers in Conservation

Each year, interns bring fresh energy, curiosity, and dedication to Teton Raptor Center. They arrive eager to learn and leave with hands-on experience that prepares them for careers in conservation, education, and wildlife care. This year's cohort has been no exception. Each one embodies the passion and teamwork at the heart of our mission.

Our year-round interns — Addie Wichman (Research), Jordan Hagel (Rehabilitation), Anna Wolke (Conservation), and Greta Cahill (Education) — have immersed themselves in every aspect of TRC's work. From assisting with research projects, to caring for injured raptors in the clinic, and connecting visitors with conservation through education programs, they have given their all. Their hard work has directly advanced our mission while allowing them to grow into the next generation of raptor biologists, educators, and advocates.

This summer, we welcomed Mairi, a high school intern, and Myles, a college intern, to our education team. They helped bring our Avian Ambassadors' stories to life — and shared these reflections as their internships came to a close:

Q: What was your favorite part of interning at TRC?

MAIRI: "My favorite part has been all of the amazing people I've been able to meet. Everyone here has so much knowledge, experience, and passion for what they do."

MYLES: "For me, it was getting a behind-the-scenes look at everything it takes to run a place like this. Seeing the daily processes that make TRC work was mind-blowing."

Q: What surprised you most?

MAIRI: "How individually unique each one of the birds is. Not just species differences—every single bird has its own temperament and needs."

MYLES: "The level of awareness you need when training an ambassador. You're constantly tuned into the bird's cues, which was a new and fascinating challenge for me."

Q: What's your biggest takeaway?

MAIRI: "Raptors are incredible teachers. They connect people to the natural world in ways that inspire action and care."

MYLES: "It takes a lot of different people and ideas working together to make conservation successful."











From feeding nestlings to supporting educational programs, interns are woven into the fabric of daily life at TRC. They leave not only with new skills and knowledge, but also with lasting connections to the raptors and people who make this work possible. We are deeply grateful for all they contribute and inspired by the bright futures ahead of them.

Avian Ambassadors



TUNDRA

Rough-legged Hawk

HATCH DATE: March 2023
SEX: Male
REASON NON-RELEASABLE: Blind in left eye
WEIGHT: 2 lbs

Tundra's journey to TRC began at the North Sky Raptor Sanctuary in Grand Traverse County, Michigan, after a collision with a vehicle left him with a serious injury and complete blindness in his left eye. With impaired vision making survival in the wild unlikely, he received expert care and rehabilitation at North Sky before joining Teton Raptor Center to begin a new chapter as an educator.

Tundra also has peculiar eyes for a raptor—his pupils are tear-drop shaped, much like those of a cat or reptile. This rare condition, known as bilateral colobomas, occurs when the irises don't fully form before hatching, giving him both a unique genetic anomaly and an iconic look.

His name, Tundra, honors the cold, northern landscapes where his species—the Rough-legged Hawk—thrives. Adapted to endure the harsh, snowy Arctic and sub-Arctic, these hawks embody resilience and strength—qualities Tundra demonstrates every day. Since his arrival, he has made remarkable progress in training, and each encounter with him reminds us of the quiet power and wonder these birds bring to our world.

BUFFY

Red-tailed Hawk

SEX: Female
REASON NON-RELEASABLE: Missing left eye
WEIGHT: 2.8 lbs
JOINED TRC TEAM: March 2024

Buffy is a female Red-tailed Hawk that was deemed unreleasable due to loss of vision in her left eye after being hit by a car in Florida in 2023. She was transferred to Teton Raptor Center in the spring of 2024, where her left eye was surgically removed. She is highly habituated to humans, showing comfort around people, and comes forward for food or when the glove is offered. She has not shown the typical fear responses you would see in a wild hawk.

Her name "Buffy" comes from the buffy coloration you can see on her chest and belly feathers. She started programming with our team in April of this year, and we are excited to have her as an addition to our team of ambassadors. She has already made great strides in participating in both onsite and offsite programming. We hope that she will continue to make an impact as an amazing avian educator and ambassador for raptor conservation.

This summer's programs marked a significant milestone in the growth of Teton Raptor Center's educational reach. With strong participation from both local residents and first-time visitors, six distinct offerings engaged audiences across all age groups and inspired meaningful connections to raptors and the ecosystems they inhabit.

Our flagship program, Raptor Discovery: Masters of the Sky, captivated guests with fascinating insights into the world of raptors, featuring our awe-inspiring ambassador birds, while complementary programs on migration, habitat, and adaptations provided deeper exploration of raptor ecology and conservation.

New pilot programs for our youngest audiences took flight this year as well. Our Raptor Explorers family program invited families, homeschool groups, and curious kids ages five and older to dive into the world of hawks, owls, eagles, and falcons through fun facts, hands-on activities, and a special ambassador meet-and-greet. For the littlest learners, Little Wings Story Time blended storytelling and songs with unforgettable up-close visits from a live raptor, creating magical first encounters for children four and younger.

The enthusiastic feedback and repeat visits demonstrate the value of these experiences. By fostering curiosity, wonder, and understanding across generations, these programs are laying

the foundation for a community more deeply connected to and invested in-the conservation of birds of prey and the landscapes they depend on.

Imagine taking off at sunrise in a small, two-seated, canvascovered plane from a quiet Wyoming airstrip, spending the next eight hours dipping, turning, and climbing like a never-ending roller coaster—only 100 feet above the ground. For our research team, this is more than an adventure. It's how we find hundreds of raptor nests scattered across Wyoming's wide-open landscapes, uncovering the stories they hold about raptor nesting, survival, and population health. This year alone, our crew spent over 250 hours in these tiny airplanes surveying nests and observing individual raptors!

In spring 2025, we completed aerial nest searches across Converse County in northeast Wyoming and the Bighorn Basin in north-central Wyoming, locating every raptor nest we could find. Follow-up flights in June let us check in on active nestsdetermining whether they succeeded and how many chicks fledged. These data, combined with work from other biologists, help us track long-term trends in raptor populations and understand the impacts of energy development in regions rich with Golden Eagles, Ferruginous Hawks, and other raptors.

In late August and early September, our team once again took to the skies to survey for individual Golden Eagles across Wyoming. Following protocols developed by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, we counted and identified the age of every eagle seen along 100-kilometer transects. The results from the past 19 years of aerial surveys tell a sobering story: Golden Eagles in Wyoming have declined by 28%, a loss of over 2,400 individuals.

Historically, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service led these surveys, but reduced funding in recent years has made it essential for others to step in. From 2022-2024, the Wyoming Natural Diversity Database supported these efforts with Teton Raptor Center's active involvement. This year, thanks to additional funding, we are able to continue this critical work-ensuring consistent monitoring of Golden Eagles and protecting the wild places they depend on.

These flights are more than science—they are acts of connection, linking us to raptors, to wild landscapes, and to a future where Golden Eagles not only survive. but thrive.

Research Biologist to Private Pilot!

In June of 2025 our Lead Research Biologist, Julie Polasik, took her involvement in flying to a whole new level and earned her Private Pilot License! After two years of conducting aerial surveys for raptors with Teton Raptor Center research projects, she was inspired by how amazing flying is and realized that she wanted to take a turn in the pilot's seat. She completed her private pilot training in Rigby, Idaho and is now working towards earning her instrument rating when she's not busy studying raptors, analyzing data, or writing manuscripts. Julie hopes to be a commercial pilot one day, taking her fellow biologists up in the planes she loves to fly to conduct raptor surveys, among other flying dreams!







There has been a 28% decline in Golden Eagle populations in Wyoming over the last 19 years (that's 2.400 Golden **Eagles lost in Wyoming** over the last 19 years).







Great Horned Owl (GHOW 25-23) patient was admitted on April 1, 2025 after a presumptive car strike with a midline tibiotarsal fracture. This bone is the long leg bone below a bird's "knee". Previously, Dr. Joe Weinman at Jackson Animal Hospital (JAH) has graciously performed all orthopedic surgeries for our patients. Recently, we have split our orthopedic equipment between both TRC and JAH to perform orthopedic surgeries in our onsite clinic. Dr. Salene Freeman performed our first onsite orthopedic surgery on this patient, aligning the very displaced tibiotarsal fracture successfully. Dr. Freeman is utilizing the most up-to-date and cutting-edge techniques in avian orthopedic surgery. These innovative methods not only accelerate recovery times but also reduce complications and advance release timelines.

Although the surgery was a success, this bird succumbed to other head trauma injuries. With the leadership of Dr. Freeman and a talented team of volunteers, pre-vet externs, interns, and staff, TRC has gone on to provide in-house orthopedic surgeries for about a dozen other patients in our clinic.

Return to the Wild: A Turkey Vulture's Journey

On July 1, 2025, an adult Turkey Vulture was admitted to the rehabilitation clinic following a suspected vehicle collision. Diagnostic imaging revealed five fractures across both wings, and the initial prognosis was guarded.

For four weeks, the patient received intensive care including fracture stabilization, pain management, nutritional support, and structured physical therapy to maintain joint mobility and prevent muscle loss. As the bird improved, it moved to the patient care unit, where staff monitored progress remotely, tracking balance, weight-bearing, and wing use without disturbance.



The next phase took place in the flight barn, where endurance, maneuverability, and strength were assessed. Despite the severity of its injuries, the vulture demonstrated symmetrical, sustained flight. Passing all pre-release evaluations, the bird was returned to the wild on September 22, 2025, in Ashton, Idaho—taking flight immediately and joining a nearby roost site with ease.

This inspiring recovery highlights not only the remarkable adaptability of Turkey Vultures, but also the essential role of advanced veterinary care, careful rehabilitation, and dedicated staff in returning even the most severely injured raptors to their place in the wild.

This year, we expanded our lead-free kids tackle giveaway! We provided sample packs of lead-free jigheads and weights for every kid participating in youth fishing days across Wyoming and Montana and a growing number of kids in Idaho. In total we provided more than 2,000 kids with lead-free tackle and information. Let's start their fishing journeys lead-free!

Poo-Poo Project

This year, our partners in the U.S. Forest Service have continued to make a big difference for cavity-nesting birds by installing Poo-Poo Project screens on vault toilets across the country. Right here in our backyard, the Bridger-Teton National Forest, with support from Friends of the Bridger-Teton, placed 50 new screens, all provided free of charge thanks to generous donor sponsorships over the years. Meanwhile, in California, the Inyo National Forest added 30 screens after a dedicated land user noticed unprotected toilets in the area and sponsored every single one herself!

These efforts remind us how community action, whether through donations, partnerships, or individual initiative, can protect countless birds from becoming trapped in open vent pipes. Every screen saves


